News from the Scientific Program Committee

Dear Colleagues and Friends,

The Scientific Program of the EuroMedLab Athens 2017 congress (plenaries and symposia) has now been completed and the preliminary program of the congress has been published. We would like to preset here the summary of plenary lectures and debates.



The Opening Plenary Lecture EuroMedLab Athens 2017, will be given on Sunday, June 11, 2017 by Dr. David Epstein (USA) and is entitled 'The original Olympic spirit: The evolution of athletes and the tiny margins between good and great'. Dr. Epstein, the acclaimed author of the highly successful bestselling book

"The Sports Gene", will analyze genetic characteristics of top athletes and identify attributes which make them great vs good in some sports. These attributes include eyesight, muscle mass, reflexes, body structure etc. He will make the

point that the differences between good and great athletes are very small. He will also touch upon the menace of Olympic competition, performance enhancing techniques.

The second Plenary Lecture, which will be given on Monday, June 12, 2017 by Dr. George Pavlakis (Greece-USA) is entitled





'New vaccines and immunotherapies for AIDS and cancer'. We are all aware of the tremendous advances made in AIDS research, which transformed an invariably highly lethal disease into a chronic disease. There is still work ahead in finding an effective preventative vaccine and even more effective immunotherapies and other therapies for AIDS, which can eradicate the infection.

The third Plenary Lecture will be given on Tuesday, June 13, 2017 by Dr. Frannoise Baylis (Canada) and is entitled 'Human gene editing: The dawn, the zenith, and the dusk'. The discovery of the CRISPR-Cas gene editing system an associated technologies, promises to revolutionize everything, from improving animals,



plants, and, most importantly, for treating human genetic diseases. But there are also dangers associated with this technology. It now seems possible that the human genome



can be edited for purposes that are currently deemed to be unethical, such as improving intellectual performance or appearance. These highly controversial issues will be analyzed by Dr. Baylis.

The forth Plenary Lecture will be given on Wednesday, June 14, 2017 by Dr. George Chrousos (Greece) and is entitled

'The influence of stress in human disease risk'. It is widely known that stress can promote many diseases from cardiac diseases to cancer and neurodegeneration. Dr. Chrousos proclaims that an optimally responsive system against stress helps individuals with their well-being, successful performance of tasks and appropriate social interactions. On the contrary, excessive stress can cause significant morbidity and compromise the quality of life of individuals.



The fifth and final Plenary Lecture will be given on Thursday, June 15, 2017 by Dr. Nicholas Katsanis (Greece - USA) and is entitled 'Whole genome sequencing in health and disease'. Whole genome sequencing and related technologies have revolutionized the way we approach No doubt, these precision medicine. technologies will further contribute to better diagnosis and treatment of many

diseases, genetic or not, including cancer. Already, hundreds of thousands of genomes have been sequenced and it is expected that many more will be sequenced over the next 5-10 years. It is highly anticipated that this new mountain of genetic information will unravel the pathogenesis of many diseases and will suggest novel ways of treating them.



On Tuesday, June 13, 2017, Dr George Malliaras (Greece-France) will be the President's Invited Speaker and will deliver a lecture on diagnostic bioelectronics.

Bioelectronics deals with the coupling of the worlds of electronics and biology, and this coupling can go both ways. The natural ability for "recognition" in the biological world, such as between two complimentary DNA strands, can be

combined with the awesome power of microelectronics to process signals to build powerful new biosensors. At the same time, electronic devices can help "guide" biological events, for example cell growth, thereby creating new tools for biomedical research. This cross-fertilization between the two disciplines improves our understanding of life processes and forms the basis for advanced disease detection and treatment. Tools generated in this arena, such as medical diagnostics and brain implants, will dominate the future of healthcare and help increase the span and quality of our lives. They will also play a dominant role in modernizing agriculture and in protecting animal health, our food supply, and the environment.

At EuroMedLab Athens 2017, we are introducing a new feature called "Debate" or open symposia with two speakers, one delivering a point and the other a counterpoint, on hot topics in medicine and science. These sessions are open to the public and the press.



The first debate will take place on Monday, June 12, 2017 and will deal with a controversial issue of cancer screening. Dr. Ann McTiernan (USA) will advocate that screening may be beneficial in extending life in certain types of cancer, especially breast cancer, while Dr. Laura Esserman (USA) will advocate that screening is not cost effective and also has side effects, such as overdiagnosis and overtreatment.



On Tuesday, June 13, 2017, the second debate will be on the ethics of gene editing and will include Dr. Nicholas Katsanis (Greece - USA) and Dr. Françoise Baylis(Canada). ethical background of editing plants, animals and humans will be

discussed in detail. The two speakers will draft a path of moving forward, without compromising the safety of our society.



On Wednesday, June 14, 2017, the third debate will explore the topic of 'direct to consumer testing' with Dr. Rodger Seccombe (Canada) and Dr. Daniel Holmes (Canada). While Dr. Seccombe advocates that some direct to consumer testing may be

beneficial to the society at large, Dr. Holmes will argue that current state-of-the-art technologies for direct to consumer testing may produce results that are unreliable and may lead to overdiagnosis and overtreatment of certain diseases.




On Thursday, June 15, 2017, the fourth and final debate will deal with 'antidoping testing' with Dr. David Epstein (USA), our opening speaker, and Dr. Geoffrey S. Baird (USA). By current rules,

well-known that many top athletes still receive performance enhancing drugs, and this doping passes undetected with current techniques. Dr. Epstein suggests that authorities should intensify antidoping testing, while Dr. Baird advocates that the free access to performance enhancing drugs by all athletes may be another way of solving this problem.

News from the Abstracts Evaluation Committee (AEC)



As in any other EuroMedlab Congress, a vital part in EuroMedlab Athens 2017 will be the opportunity for every Laboratory Specialist to present novel research ideas and applications through vivid discussions in the poster area or after an oral communication in one of the EuroMedlab symposia.

The call for abstracts in 30 topics —practically, in every field of Clinical Chemistry and Laboratory Medicine- culminated in almost a thousand submissions (precisely, 995) till the deadline set by the Scientific Committee (Nov.1st, earlier than any other time!). Presenting authors had also the option to choose whether their abstract could be a candidate of an oral presentation in a corresponding (or at least, relevant) session of the Scientific program.

The task to review and evaluate these submissions felt upon the members of the Abstracts Evaluation Committee (AEC). Members of the International Scientific Advisory Board (ISAB) of the EuroMedlab Athens 2017 Congress were asked to propose 2-5 reviewers per country. One-hundred sixteen proposals of experts from 24 EFLM National Societies came out. The AEC selection was based both on merit (publication record, both overall and specific according to the topic in need) and on an effort to include as many EFLM National Societies as possible; 55 reviewers were selected from 18 countries (except for the host country National Society, all others had a maximum number of five reviewers).

Two reviewers were assigned per topic and they were grading each abstract on a scale 0-5 (5 for the excellent abstract on a novel idea). The burden of abstracts' reviewing was different per reviewer due to the fact that some topics were more popular than others: Analytical technologies

and applications topped with 104 abstracts, Biomarkers in cancer followed closely with 98 abstracts and then a cluster of topics such as Laboratory Management/Accreditation, Microbiology/Infectious diseases, Endocrinology and Cardiovascular diseases/Cardiac markers with 62, 58, 57 and 56 abstracts respectively. On average, each reviewer had to review 36 abstracts (range 6-104).

The quality of the abstracts was judged to be very satisfactory by AEC members (the average grade from all 1990 reviews was 3.41). One hundred thirty-six abstracts with a total score 8-10 among those with a positive reply for an oral communication were sent to the Symposia chairs for their final pick of those speakers that will fill the frame of their respective Symposia. Forty six abstracts were rejected due to their total low grade (≤2), thus reaching a 4,6% rejection rate for our EuroMedlab Congress. Another 52 presenting authors were asked for revisions (clarifications on missing points, rephrasing, clerical or syntax errors) before the final acceptance of their work.

The selected posters are going to be displayed at the Congress, arranged by topics on Monday, 12th June, Tuesday, 13th June and Wednesday, 14th June. In order to encourage discussions about posters, the poster Presenter must be at the assigned poster panel from 13:00 to 14:30. Poster walking tours will also be organized from 13:30 to 14:30.

How to get to Athens

Athens is easily accessed by air, sea and land (road and railroad) as it is the Greece's capital and one of the major cities of the Balkans and the Eastern Mediterranean area. Moreover, moving around the city is a real pleasure. Athens public transportation system connects the city center and Megaron - Athens International Conference Center, the Congress Venue, with all surrounding areas through a modern network combining many lines of metro, suburban railway, train, buses, trolleys and trams. The road system has been modernized in recently with new highways. The capital is connected with other parts of the mainland through a

York, Larnaca and Dubai come in at least once per day. Located 33 km (20 miles) southeast of Athens, it is easily accessible via Attiki Odos, a major highway part of the Athens City Ring Road. Public transport to Athens and the port of Piraeus is provided by the new metro system, express airport bus connections, taxi and high-speed rail.

A free shuttle bus service, courtesy of Mindray, from airport to Megaron Athens International Conference Center and Downtown Athens hotels, will be offered to all registered delegates and accompanying persons at their arrival at the Athens International Airport.




